### DID YOU KNOW THAT HORSE SLAUGHTER IS AN ONGOING BUSINESS IN CANADA?

In 2007, the U.S. government defunded inspections of their equine slaughterhouses and this legislative move prompted the business to shift to Canada.

There are currently two federally licensed slaughterhouses operating in Canada that are permitted to slaughter horses. One is in Alberta and the other in Quebec; both are owned by the same company, Bouvry Exports Calgary.

Efforts to end horse slaughter and the live exports of draft horses to Asia for slaughter are ongoing.

Live draft horses are shipped primarily to Japan for slaughter for human consumption. These horses are crowded up to three or four large animals per wooden crate. The crates are considered to be completely inadequate for this purpose.

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) is responsible for overseeing the business of horse slaughter and has not fulfilled its role adequately.



In 2020 Canadian icon, Jann Arden, joined our fight to end the trade of the live draft horse shipments. Since then, we have seen a sharp increase in awareness and demands for the trade to end.



In 2021, 1902 draft horses were exported to Japan for slaughter.

Please contact your MP and ask that they support or consider introducing legislation that would prohibit the slaughter of horses in Canada. Also contact the Prime Minister, Right Hon. Justin Trudeau.

Sign e-petitions. Send emails and letters, then follow up by phone. Remind your MP and PM that drugs which are prohibited for use during the life of any animal destined for the human food supply are routinely being administered to horses.

Also contact the Ministry of Health, and the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA), the federal agencies responsible for horse slaughter in Canada, as well as members of the Standing Committee on Agriculture and Agri-Food.

Remind your MP that the live draft horse trade as well as the domestic slaughter trade are giving Canada a black eye in the international community.

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

#### THE FACTS

- Most horses in North America are not bred for human consumption. A large percentage of horses killed in Canada are from the US where no identification system for horses exists. Canada's Equine Identification Document system is highly flawed and does not guarantee truth or accuracy.
- Horse meat products are likely to contain prohibited substances such as Phenylbutazone, Ventipulmin, and Nitrofurans.

- ➤ In 2021 the total value of horse meat exports was \$28,589 million (Source: Statistics Canada).
- ➤ In comparison, the live horse industry has been deemed to be worth \$19 billion (Source: Equine Canada Study, 2010).
- Horses are considered by most to be companion animals and working partners. - ➤ A 2020 Research Co. poll found that: "The export of Canadian horses abroad for slaughter is rejected by 67% of respondents, and 65% of respondents think it is inappropriate to consume horses."

The slaughter of horses, no matter how it is done, is not and never will be peaceful euthanasia. The majority of horses sent to slaughter come from auctions here in Canada and the U.S. These auctions are the gateway to slaughter. Horse dealers known as "kill buyers" frequent auctions looking for fit, healthy horses to fulfill their contracts with the slaughter plants.

No horse is safe from the slaughter pipeline. Some people will send unfit and sick horses to an auction rather than taking care of the horse themselves.

The beautiful, happy horse on the left, Backstreet Bully, was once owned by the Stronach Group and despite their best efforts, he slipped through the cracks, went to auction and was slaughtered at Les Viandes de la Petite-Nation (LPN) slaughter house in Quebec.



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
